(2): Sept 12th is Magazine Evening and the 2021/22 internal competition awards.


Three club members will present:

Three-way Battle ... no Turnberrie's meeting 5th Sept

The Three-way Battle has returned to its traditional place in the programme this year following the pandemic. Three clubs compete: Ourselves, Sodbury and Yate, and Crossbow (based in Frampton Cotterell). The three clubs take it in turn to be host. Each year the host club nominates a location which members of the three clubs visit on a specific day and have all day to take photographs. Each club chooses 25 images which go forward for judging at the host club in September (Monday 5th this year).



Members are encouraged to attend the judging, which is always friendly. The judging will not be available to view on Zoom, so be there or miss out.

The first Monday in September would normally be the first meeting of our season, so please note that this year we

will NOT be meeting at Turnberrie's until Sept 12th.

Photo Clinic - Any member's opportunity for focussed feedback

Photo Clinic replaces the Members' Evenings which have been a recent feature of the Club programme, and is a slight variation on something that has been done by the club in the past.

All members, whatever their photographic interests or standard, are encouraged to contribute one or more of their own images for the evening. The photographers are asked to submit with each image a question or discussion point. This could range from "How should I edit the image if I intend to submit it into a competition?" to "Why is the tree in the background so fuzzy?" or perhaps more philosophically "What emotion does this image inspire in you?" Really anything you like.

These images (or a selection of them if there are too many) will be displayed one-by-one. There will be a panel of members with varied experience and interests, and one of them will be picked to start discussion on each image, based on the question posed by the photographer. After this anyone, panel member or not, can join in the discussion. The panel is there to stimulate discussion, not to monopolise it.

Any member may submit images for discussion, even those members who are on the panel.

This is intended to be a friendly and informative evening. It is not a competition and the degree of "critique" to which each image is subjected (for want of a better word) will depend on the question which the photographer poses. Images might be your best work, but they may be things you know are flawed, or just things you like (or even hate).
