

Zoom has established itself in Society for the choices and flexibility it offers. Specifically in our club it has become a valued part of our ability to hold a wide range of meetings. Members who discussed in committee meetings (held, naturally, via Zoom).

That said, members will be aware of occasional difficulties and interruptions to the flow of meetings when technical issues (from sound, Zoom or other causes) have played up. So have our attempts to embrace technology as well as we can as often as we can gone too far? Unsurprisingly, the committee has heard from members about this and has its own views as well, so it's something that is regularly suit us. The ongoing way of seeing this is as set out below:

Continue with Zoom for:

- internal results evenings
- digital image presentations
- AV, video and exe file presentations where the tech team are confident that things will run smoothly
- groups that use Zoom for virtual meetings (eg Black & White or Committee)

Meetings that will be run only for attendees in Turnberrie's:

- social events
- roundtable or interactive discussions (this includes critique evenings or AGM)

- predominantly print presentations
- any situation where the tech team are not confident things will run smoothly

One aspect members have been uncomfortable with has been the use of a 'roving mic' in Turnberrie's when there are questions from the floor and people have been asked to wait before speaking. This has already stopped, and that change will continue.

The tech team will still actively monitor Zoom, and they will try even harder via 'Chat' to ensure that the remote experience is as good as possible.
